Portage: **Portage** or **portaging** is the practice of carrying water craft or cargo over land, either around an obstacle in a river, or between two bodies of water. A place where this carrying occurs is also called a **portage**. Portaging in the 19th century consisted of using horses and carts to carry cargo. This was especially difficult and dangerous over mountainous terrain.


ROADS, CANALS, OR RAILROADS?

Wanting a more efficient way to travel and shipping between the plain states in the west and the cities in the east, the Eerie Canal was completed in 1825. The canal was a man made water route between Lake Erie, of the Great Lakes, and the Hudson River, in New York – which empties in the Atlantic Ocean. The success of the Erie Canal encouraged many other states to build canals, leading to a canal boom in the early 1800s.


Miles of New York State Canals and Railroads, 1830-1850
